## WHITHER ISRAEL

One afternoon we dropped in upon an aged Jesuit classical scholar and found him chuckling over a passage he was reading in the original Greek of Strabo, the historical geographer of the century before Christ. Treating of Palestine, Strabo said "In this land dwell the race known as the Jews who are to be found in every part of the civilized world. And wherever they have gone, it has always been but a short time before they have secured the mastery".

It is true that because of their abilities in business and the professions, their activity in social movements and their propaganda awareness, they have been able to secure a power wherever they have gone far in excess of their numerical proportions. This success has been instrumental in making them often the scapegoat of political risings of the past as in Hitler's Germany of the present. There is an undercurrent of anti-Semitism in our own country. Native Americans resent the quick moneyed success of some Jew newly arrived in the country who by financial acuteness and painstaking labors beyond the ordinary manages to acquire a flourishing business in a short time. That resentment often develops into hate for the entire race, and unjustly so.

Catholics particularly, of all those calling themselves Christians, should disavow all anti-Semitic intolerance. The Son of God in His wisdom chose to be born a Jew, and for years Jews were almost the only Christians. We owe our Faith to that small band, one a converted Pharisee, whom He selected from that race to propagate His message. Their Scriptures are ours and Christ was the fulfillment of their Scriptures as millions of them from Peter's time to ours have proclaimed. Pope Pius XI vigorously reminded the Christian world that "We are all Semites spiritually".

One third of the world's Jews are in the United States; they no longer have a priesthood or a temple, but their synagogues are directed by rabbis or "teachers"—nine of every ten Jews do not belong to any synagogue. To espouse the Catholic Faith, many of them have come to realize, is not a betrayal of their fathers but a fulfillment of their heritage, a final finding of the God of Abraham revealed through the promised Messiah. And so there are many, many fine and active Catholics racially Jews; there are priests with names like Goldberg and Lemann and Ginsburg and Katz; and there might be many more late additions to the throngs who followed Christ in Judea,—men eager to turn their talents

and abilities to His use—were Catholics as a whole more sympathetic and ready to accept the Jew as a brother for whom also Christ died.

Down deep in the Jew is a yearning for the thing we have received through his faithful forefathers—our contact can help him to it by our tolerance and fellowship—the Faith for which Peter and Paul died.

Zema, S.J., the Moderator, to Richard Deely '18, Alumni President and to Cyril McDermott, '21 who was the capable chairman of the Smoker Committee. But the attraction of the evening was the entertainment which numbered sport shots and projector contributed by J. Andrew Burke, '28, the comedy and mystery of Mr. A. J. Corrado's men and the appearance of popular Jack Lavelle and Don Dunphy and the intense rendition of Kipling's battle delirium "Boots" by J. Taylor Breen, '19.
